New Report – Ageing Matters: Listening to B.C. Seniors

This new report reaffirms B.C. seniors on fixed incomes are disproportionately impacted by the high cost of living and unable to absorb increased costs for housing, food, medical equipment, mobility aids and other necessities for healthy ageing. The report is based on the issues raised to new Seniors Advocate Dan Levitt during his 'listening tour' in April 2024, travelling throughout the province to meet with seniors in both rural and urban communities and hear their concerns.

Stay Cool this Summer: Apply for a Free Air Conditioner

If your household meets the income requirements for the BC Hydro Energy Conservation Assistance Program, you may be eligible to receive a free portable AC unit and one-time installation. People who have received a recommendation letter from their regional health authority's Home Care Program are also eligible, no matter their income. National Injury Prevention Day

July 5 is Injury Prevention Day in Canada and a reminder that falls are the one of the most common preventable injuries for older people. In fact, they are the leading cause of injury-related hospitalizations among people aged 65 or older. Seniors can reduce their risk of falls by increasing their strength and balance, having an annual medication review and vision assessment, and removing home hazards. UBC Nursing researchers highlight resident and family councils' impact on long-term care

(University of British Columbia School of Nursing)

Two new studies from UBC's School of Nursing are examining how resident and family councils enhance the experience of long-term care (LTC) home residents. Backed by the BC Ministry of Health's residential care regulations, these councils are designed to represent LTC residents' collective interests, giving them a voice in how their home is run.

Disaster Awareness and Preparedness Among Older Adults in Canada Regarding Floods, Wildfires, and Earthquakes

(International Journal of Disaster Risk Science)

Older adults are significantly impacted by natural hazards and disasters that are exacerbated by climate change. Understanding their awareness and preparedness is essential for enhancing disaster resilience. This study investigated the attitudes, actions, and recommendations of older adults regarding natural hazards that pose risks in their geographic area—specifically floods, wildfires, and/or earthquakes in Canada.
