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Disaster Financial Assistance Available for Lower Mainland Residents

Lower Mainland residents impacted by flooding due to severe weather events from October 18 to 20, 2024 may be eligible for Disaster Financial Assistance from the B.C. government. Eligible communities include City of Coquitlam, City of North Vancouver, City of Port Coquitlam, City of Port Moody, City of Surrey, District of North Vancouver, District of West Vancouver, Squamish First Nation, and Village of Anmore.

Canadian Clinical Guidelines on Social Isolation and Loneliness in Older Adults

(Canadian Geriatrics Journal)

Preventing and addressing social isolation and loneliness among older adults is important because of the known associations with negative health outcomes. The

Canadian Coalition for Seniors' Mental Health (CCSMH) took on the task of creating clinical guidelines.

Social participation of older people in urban and rural areas: Canadian Longitudinal Study on Ageing

(BMC Geriatrics)

Although the positive influence of social activity on health is now well-established, a complex relationship exists among social participation and the environment. Social participation of older adults was examined in rural and urban settings to identify features of the built environment and perception of neighborhood specific to the locale.

The little intervention that could: creative ageing implies healthy aging among Canadian seniors

(Aging & Mental Health)

Through a process of 'creative ageing', there is increased interest in how active participation in the arts can help promote health and well-being among seniors. However, few studies have quantitatively examined the benefits of a foray into artistic expression, and even fewer employ rigorous identification strategies. Addressing this knowledge gap, we use a series of quantitative techniques (ordinary least squares and quantile regression) to analyze the impact of an arts-based intervention targeting the elderly.
